

# Our ocean is filling up with trash. And most of this trash is plastics.

Plastic bags, fishing line, aluminum cans, food wrappers and cigarettes – these are just some of the millions of items littering our shores, fouling our environment, threatening wildlife and affecting our businesses.

For decades, volunteers with Ocean Conservancy's International Coastal Cleanup have removed millions of pounds of trash from our oceans, beaches and waterways every fall. While most walk, many set out on boats and others venture underwater in search of trash. They not only pick up trash, they count every item as well. The resulting item-by-item, location-by-location Ocean Trash Index provides the only global snapshot of the ocean trash littering the world's coasts and waterways. Cleanup volunteers will be out again next year, and the year after that and the year after that. But cleaning up trash only does so much. What we need to do is stop trash at the source, before it reaches the water.

Ocean trash isn't an ocean problem; it's a people problem – one that is entirely preventable. Keeping our ocean free from trash is one of the easiest ways we can make the ocean more resilient. Ocean Conservancy is at the forefront of building a movement to stop trash before it reaches our waterways.



## **LEADING THE WAY**

At Ocean Conservancy, we're always looking for new solutions for a changing ocean. We're engaging our network of partners and volunteers to stop the flow of trash at the source before it has a chance to reach the water and threaten wildlife, or soil our beaches and depress local economies.

Ocean Conservancy launched the Trash Free Seas Alliance<sup>®</sup> to eliminate ocean trash. The Alliance unites industry, science and conservation leaders who share a common goal for a healthy ocean free of plastics. It provides a constructive forum focused on identifying opportunities for cross-sector solutions that drive action and foster innovation.

We're also developing innovative approaches to plastic design, reuse and recovery that can be adapted to many industries and in-country waste management infrastructure.
